National Center of Academic Excellence In Cyber Defense

Indiana State University has been designated a National Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense, recognized by the National Security Agency (NSA) of the United States of America. The NSA and Department of Homeland Security jointly sponsor the CAE-CD with the goal of reducing vulnerability in our national information infrastructure by promoting higher education and research in cyber defense and producing professionals with cyber defense expertise.

In December of 2022 Dr. Jason James, an Assistant Professor in the School of Criminology and Security Studies, received the great news that Indiana State University had been recognized as a National Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense. (Continued on the next page)



This was a year-long process and review by the (NSA) during which Dr. James was key in working to meet their numerous requirements. Indiana State University will join only a "handful" of other universities that meet this requirement. Official letters of notification were sent to the Indiana State Governor, Members of Congress, and appropriate Congressional Committees A formal celebration was held on June 8, 2023 in Seattle, Washington. The designation is good through 2027, after which a review will take place in order to renew the standing by the NSA.



Alumni Recognition

Sheriff Steve Bush has had an extensive career in law enforcement. Sheriff Bush graduated from Indiana State University in 1990 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminology. He began his career with the New Albany (Indiana) Police Department in 1991 and graduated from the 109th session of the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy in 1992. During his time at New Albany he was a merit Corporal, Sergeant, Captain, and Detective for over 8 years. Steve was also in a command position as Major overseeing budget and payroll along with being a commander over the Detective Division. Steve was a SWAT team member for 8 years, general instructor and a field training officer. He received numerous awards as a New Albany police officer.



In 2023 Steve was elected as the sheriff of Floyd County, Indiana and retired from New Albany PD. During his first two months in office his department has been working on programming both inside and outside of the jail an effort to create and improve programs to combat mental health and addiction issues. They have instituted a program where officers are carrying Narcan in their cars, and putting education programs back in the jail and working with the courts on re-entry programs for inmates going back into society. These are just a few examples of what Steve's department is doing.

From 2004-2016 Sheriff Bush also served as a county commissioner. During that time he helped in controlling and maintaining county property, including the courthouse and jail. He helped oversee construction of roads and bridges, including planning and zoning. As a Commissioner, he received the Sagamore Award in 2016.

During his time at Indiana State University Sheriff Bush ran cross country and track and was a letterman in cross country. A highlight of his running career since leaving ISU was qualifying for and running in the 118th Boston Marathon in 2018. Sheriff Bush said, "The weather was horrible that day (41 degrees, 30 mph head wind and rain), but I set a personal record and finished the race when over one-third of the elite field dropped out."

Sheriff Bush has been married to his wife Danna for 30 years and they have two adult



children, Christian 26 and Ashley 24. They have three grand-children ages 1, 2 and 3. In March of 2023 Sheriff Bush returned to ISU with some of his staff to attend the criminology career fair. We would like to thank Sheriff Bush for his service in law enforcement and we hope to have him back to campus in the near future.

Alumni Recognition

Matt Thompson started his career for Lowes in Asset Protection (AP) in an entry level position. After learning the business quickly from a couple of great store managers and doing well in the AP role, he was promoted to a Senior AP Manager and given responsibility over several stores and was responsible for training new AP Specialist. Matt picked up the job quickly and really enjoyed the investigative responsibility, as well as his involvement in the overall business and the impact AP has on the bottom line.

She found that several agencies of the Intelligence Community are hiring individuals with this license (e.g. the Nation al Security Agency or NSA). INAN students, Ashlyn Kopf and Payton Ferency also passed their FCC Technician class exams.

In April, 2023, the Sycamore Leadership Awards and the Amateur Radio Club won best Emerging Student Organization. President of the club, Rowan Eggert said, "One year ago, we still met in the conference room in HH and hoped that we could get the club off the ground for the next semester. Many more licenses and meetings later, we got a ham shack, lots of new members, and some new equipment. We are turning into the club we have always wanted to be and I'm proud to continue that effort next year."

The Amateur Radio Club at Indiana State University (ARC@ISU) held a "Parks on the Air" (POTA) event at Turkey Run State Park on Sat 9/23/2023. About two dozen members of the Club and the Wabash Valley amateur radio community (Terre Haute) attended.

Franklin T. Wilson, PhD, an Associate Professor of Criminology, has received the 2022-2023 Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences (ACJS) Outstanding Mentor Award. He is one of six to receive this year's award. Less than 100 individuals have received this award since its inception.

The international award is presented to individuals who "during the course of their career have made a significant contribution to the professional development of graduate students and junior faculty members in criminal justice." He is also the first professor from a university in the state of Indiana to receive the award. Wilson was nominated by a former colleague and multiple former graduate students. He will be presented with the award during the awards luncheon at the ACJS Annual Meeting in National Harbor, Maryland in March.

This is not the first time Wilson has been recognized for his mentoring skills and knowledge of criminal justice education. In 2022, he was named a Mentor for the Center for Justice Research's Research Development Institute (RDI), housed at Teyas Southern University "was

The Research Development Institute (RDI), housed at Texas Southern University, "was established to address the lack of culturally-responsive, justice-related research training and development opportunities for students and faculty." The fellowship program focuses on the research and professional development of Ph.D. students and new academics across the United States.

In 2019 he was a State of Opportunity in America Summit Invitee. This event is conducted by The Center for Advancing Opportunity (CAO), a Washington, D.C.-based research and education initiative created by a partnership with the Thurgood Marshall College Fund, the Charles Koch Foundation, and Koch Industries. The summit focused on At Risk Communities and the role of education and criminal justice. Only 200 scholars, entrepreneurs, civic and private leaders were invited to take part. Wilson was named in



the Indiana State University First Destination Survey by Classes 2020, 2021, and 2022 as having contributed to student success at ISU. In 2020, he was named one of the top 20 Influencers in Criminology by Cronycle and in 2017 he was named one of fifteen Top Criminology and Criminal Justice Professors on Twitter by OnlineEducation.com.
