# **HOW TO REACH US**

It is with great pleasure that I welcome you to a new academic year! It's hard to believe that summer is behind us and cooler temperatures are moving in! We've had an excellent start to the academic year. Undergraduate enrollments are up and our first-time-full-time freshman have increased nearly 74% compared to last year. This is exciting news compared to continued state and national declines in undergraduate teacher preparation. Graduate enrollment remains strong but declined a little over 5% since last year. Graduate school enrollment is down nationally at nearly the same percentage.

We're pleased to announce the addition of Otter Creek Middle in the Vigo County School Corporation (VCSC) to the array of Professional Development Schools (PDS's). Also included are Northview High School in the Clay Community Schools, and Rosedale Elementary in the Southwest Parke Community Schools. We're grateful for Lynn Scott and Della Thacker's service to the schools as the PDS Faculty Liaisons. On page ten you'll see a picture of Della awarding our most recent recipient of the Robert O. C.H.I.L.L. (Colleagues Helping Implement Lifelong Learning) first monthly meeting is on Tuesday, September 16 from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. in University Hall 325.

The Adams Uncommon Sense Initiative is a partnership with 17 school districts, which offers New Teachers and Mentors an opportunity to come together weekly for conversations about teaching, focused on a book, Uncommon Sense for New Teachers: A Good Beginning is Half the Work, which provides 52 chapter topics that can be read in any order. The idea is to provide ways of thinking "uncommonly" about the challenges and opportunities we have today, so new teachers and mentors are supercharged in working together, learning from each other, and making a difference in the educational lives of students.

Attending an on-campus inaugural event were educators who traveled together intentionally in district teams, so that robust conversations could span the entire commute to and from campus. Each participating team was provided an audio prompt from Professor Dr. Ryan Donlan, event and Initiative host and facilitator, to discuss on the ride to campus and then spent the day in active, thought-provoking activities with Dr. Donlan, with guest presentations from Dr. Andrea Forcum and Dr. Steve Gruenert, along with kind welcomes from program, department, and college leadership. Department of Educational Leadership Graduate Assistant Arianna Greene and Administrative Assistant Kellie McCain provided deft coordination and day-long organization of program and activities; Sodexo catered masterfully. Ambassadorship at the event will allow for weekly social media content (YouTube shorts) to be provided on topics for participating districts throughout the school year, with a virtual event planned for Spring 2026. Each participating district will also be provided one customized, on-site event by Dr. Donlan, on a topic relevant to any group the district selects - could be teachers, staff, administrators, board members, or all. Goals for the partnership include capacity building throughK-12/University learning experiences and educational pipeline development and interest in our profession, including expansion of Preferred Partnership and educational pathways programming offered by the Bayh College of Education. Funds and support were generously provided by the BCOE Dean's Office and The ISU Foundation with the A. Elmwood and Juneth S. Adams Award.

## FROM DR. CARRIE BALL


Our Teacher Residency Program, in partnership with Vigo County School Corporation and Southwest Parke Community Schools is entering its fourth year. This year, 17 students will complete a full-year placement in an elementary classroom as they complete their degree requirements. The program allows students to earn a stipend and gain valuable immersive experiences in the classroom!

The elementary and special education programs continue to scale up new early field experiences that emphasize the science of reading. This semester, we will have 46 teacher candidates engaged in local classrooms to support and contribute to high-quality reading instruction for elementary students.

Over the summer, the Department of Teaching & Learning partnered with Vigo County School Corporation to offer literacy-focused professional development to almost 200 area teachers. This work is made possible by the generous support of the Lilly Endowment through its Advancing the Science of Reading in Indiana grant initiative.

Dr. Youjin Yang recently received a "STEM Through Storybooks" grant from the Community Engaged Alliance. This project will support partnerships with early childhood programs in the community to foster STEM learning and early literacy development among preschool children. The Department of Teaching and Learning is proud to announce an upcoming Autism & Exercise workshop, which will be held in the Indiana State University Arena from 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. on Friday, October 3. On October 10, 2025, the Department of Teaching & Learning will host a professional learning session entitled Bridging Speech and Literacy: The SLP's Role in the Science of Reading. Led by Morgan Mason, Professional Learning Specialist with Keep Indiana Learning, the session will explore how speech-language pathologists can apply Science of Reading principles to strengthen language, literacy, and student achievement. This event, offered to faculty and students in the Communication Disorders program is made possible through the generous support of the Lilly Endowment's Advancing the Science of Reading in Indiana grant initiative, and will take place from 8:30–11:30 AM in UH325.




The Speech Pathology Master's Program added a new clinical introduction program called Path to Practice. The 20 new cohort members were lead through clinical topics such as evaluation of clients, session set up, data collection, and behavior management.

The six two hour sessions included hands on practice and completion of simulations. Having Path to Practice in addition to regular course time provides our new graduates with the knowledge they need to begin working with their clients this semester.

The Department of Teaching and Learning recently welcomed its second cohort of six students from South Korea to participate in a collaborative master's degree program. Many of these students are experienced teachers in South Korea and are studying in the United States to earn an advanced degree while gaining cross-cultural teaching experience.


