
We are excited to present our Fall 2025 Program! With over 60 courses and events to choose from, we are confident that there is something for everyone.

Session two focuses on the 6888th Central Postal Battalion—African American women soldiers who cleared a massive mail backlog for WWII troops overseas. The final session examines how James Brown's concert in Boston helped prevent unrest following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Each session offers a compelling look at resilience, service, and leadership in pivotal moments.

Shadows of Fear Part II Conspiracy Theories in American History with Dr. Dan Clark

Dr. Ganis, author of *Andy Warhol's Serial Photography*, brings unique insights from his time at the Andy Warhol Foundation.

Beyond the Upside Down The Real 80s Behind Stranger Things with Dr. Linda Maule

From Revolution to Civil Rights

African Americans have served in every U.S. military conflict, fighting for both their country and their own rights. From Black patriots in the Revolutionary War to the 180,000 African Americans who fought for the Union in the Civil War, their contributions have shaped American history. After the war, Black soldiers gained congressional approval to enlist in the peacetime Army, leading to the formation of the "Buffalo Soldiers." This course traces their service from the War of 1812 to World War II, highlighting their valor in conflicts abroad and their struggle against segregation and discrimination at home. It is the story of their resilience, sacrifice, and fight for equality in a nation that often failed to recognize their service.

John Langellier has spent decades researching African Americans in the US military. His work includes articles and books such as *More Work Than Glory: Buffalo Soldiers in the United States Army* and *Buffalo Soldiers in Arizona*.

Impressionism: Color, Light, Leisure

Impressionist painters revolutionized art with a new style that emphasized changing atmospheric effects and luminous color harmonies. Their unblended brushstrokes of pure color and simple compositions broke dramatically with traditional pictorial techniques. Rejecting historical, mythological, and religious themes, they instead focused on the rapidly shifting aspects of modern life—capturing scenes from the countryside, the home, and the city. This course examines the work of Monet, Renoir, Degas, Cassatt, and Morisot from the 1860s to the 1910s, exploring their stylistic and technical innovations, personal lives, and the cultural forces shaping their artistry.

Lauren Weingarden, Professor Emerita of Art History at Florida State University, researches 19th-century art and literature, particularly Louis Sullivan, Charles Baudelaire, and Edouard Manet.

The course explores how diverse perspectives and unique skills contribute to conservation efforts, offering participants practical ways to take meaningful action in protecting wildlife and ecosystems.

Stephanie Arne is an international wildlife conservationist, expedition guide, and storyteller. She is the former host of *Mutual of Omaha's Wild Kingdom* and has appeared on *Animal Planet, The Weather Channel, The Harry Connick Jr. Show,* and *The Drew Barrymore Show.*

Legendary Great Lakes Shipwrecks

With Anna Lardinois

Thursdays, October 9, 16, 23, 30 November 6, 13 7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Beneath the surface of the Great Lakes lie thousands of shipwrecks, each with a story to tell. This course brings these lost vessels back to life through vivid storytelling and historical exploration. The course examines the tragic sinking of the Lady Elgin, the haunting legacy of the Eastland, the mystery of the Western Reserve, and the enduring legend of the Edmund Fitzgerald, alongside other unforgettable wrecks that shaped the history of the Great Lakes. More than just maritime history, this course uncovers the human stories behind these disasters, the forces that doomed them, and the myths that linger today.

Anna Lardinois is an author, storyteller, and history enthusiast with a passion for uncovering dramatic and often chilling tales from the past. She is the author of *Shipwrecks of the Great Lakes: Tragedies and Legacies from the Inland Seas* (2021) and more than a dozen books on history, folklore, and ghostly legends.

The Films of Cassavetes & Rowlands

With Heather Brown, PhD

Fridays, October 10, 17, 24, 31 November 7, 14 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

This course explores the groundbreaking collaborations between John Cassavetes and Gena Rowlands, two of independent cinema's most influential figures. Cassavetes revolutionized American filmmaking with raw, characterdriven storytelling, while Rowlands' deeply expressive performances are among the most mesmerizing in film history. The course examines Cassavetes' unconventional filmmaking methods, such as handheld cinematography, long takes, and spontaneous performances. The course also analyzes Rowlands' emotionally intense acting in landmark roles such as *A Woman Under the Influence* (1974), *Opening Night* (1977), and *Gloria* (1980). And finally, the course explores the collaborative nature of Cassavetes' productions, his rejection of Hollywood conventions, and his lasting impact on contemporary filmmaking

Heather Brown holds a PhD in English with a concentration in rhetoric and composition from the University of Maryland.

American History in Six Songs

With Matt Jennings, PhD

Tuesdays, October 14, 21, 28 November 4, 11, 18 5:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Music matters everywhere, and America's varied musical heritage offers a profound way to understand crucial moments in its history. This course explores Indigenous expressions, the impact of colonial invasion, the profound influence of forced African migration, and the significant cultural shifts of the 19th, 20th, and 21st centuries. Through the interplay of diverse musical genres and traditions, the course examines how music effectively captures the evolving American experience.

Matt Jennings, PhD is Professor of History at Middle Georgia State University. He has authored several books on Native American and local history, including *New Worlds of Violence, The Flower Hunter and the People,* and *Ocmulgee National Monument: A Brief History with Field Notes*. While he specializes in Native American history, he teaches in a variety of fields, including the history of music in America.

Peeking Inside the Black Box

With Johnnie Hendrickson, PhD

Tuesdays, October 14, 21, 28 November 4, 11, 18 3:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

For anyone who has ever felt like scientists are constantly changing their minds, this course offers a behind-the-scenes look at the scientific process, exploring how modern science developed and what scientists actually do. The course examines what makes research reliable, delving into the strengths and weaknesses of scientific methodology. The course uncovers common pitfalls and identifies red flags for pseudoscience and untrustworthy findings. Rather than relying on blind faith, participants will learn how to evaluate research critically and find trust in the scientific process. This approach provides tools to assess research and guide decisions about health, behavior, and the environment.

Dr. Johnnie Hendrickson is a Teaching Professor in the School of Molecular Sciences at Arizona State University. He holds a PhD in chemistry and is the author of the textbook *Chemistry in the World*.

The Telephone 150 Years Later

With Bernard Carlson

Wednesdays, October 15, 22, 29 November 5, 12, 19 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

More than any other invention of the past 150 years, the telephone transformed how we communicate and conduct business. This course explores Alexander Graham Bell's groundbreaking 1875 concept for transmitting sound over an electric wire. It delves into his struggles to commercialize the telephone with his father-in-law, Gardiner Hubbard, and his rivalry with inventors Elisha Gray and Thomas Edison. The course also examines the rise and fall of AT&T as a corporate giant and the evolution from wired networks to today's cellular and smartphone technologies, highlighting the profound impact of this invention.

Bernard (Bernie) Carlson is Vaughan Professor Emeritus of Humanities at the University of Virginia and an expert on invention, entrepreneurship, and the role of technology in society. Now based in Ireland, he directs the MS program in AgInnovation at the University of Galway.

In Darwin's Footsteps

With Eric Simon, PhD

Thursdays, October 16, 23, 30 November 6, 13, 20 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

From 1831-1836, Charles Darwin circumnavigated the globe aboard the HMS Beagle. In the Galapagos Islands and elsewhere, Darwin collected data that, after decades of study and reflection, formed part of the basis for his publication *On the Origin of Species*. The ideas presented in that volume remain the foundation of all modern biological thought. Drawing upon original source materials and the instructor's photos, this course presents the historical and cultural context of Darwin's era, follows the five-year journey, discusses how Darwin came to his ideas, and explains his theories in detail.

Dr. Eric Simon, professor of Biology at New England College, received his PhD in biochemistry from Harvard University. Dr. Simon is the author of a widely used series of college biology textbooks that help teach biology to students in over 40 countries.

Graceful Exits

With Aleen Bayard, PhD

Mondays, October 20, 27 November 3, 10, 17, 24 5:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

This course explores the complex issue of Death with Dignity, also known as assisted suicide, through its historical development, ethical debates, legal frameworks, and cultural perspectives. The movement gained national attention through the advocacy of Dr. Jack Kevorkian, sparking widespread discussion on end-of-life choices. Participants will critically examine evolving policies on physician-assisted suicide and euthanasia while engaging in thoughtful discussions on this sensitive and often controversial topic. Designed to educate and foster awareness, this course provides a comprehensive look at the ethical and legal dimensions of end-of-life decision-making.

Aleen Bayard, PhD is an adjunct faculty member at Northwestern University, teaching leadership and change management. Bayard holds degrees from Stanford, Columbia, and Northwestern; she earned her doctorate from Benedictine University.

The Power of One in Spielberg Films

Mondays, October 20, 27 November 3, 10, 17, 24 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

In Steven Spielberg's Academy Award-winning Schindler's List (1993), a character quotes from scripture: "He who saves a life saves the world entire." Through scene-by-scene analysis, this course explores variations on this theme across a selection of Spielberg films. With a focus on dialogue and action that reveal characters' inner beliefs and moral choices, this course examines how the world is saved—or not. The class analyzes the following films: Close Encounters of the Third Kind, Lincoln, Bridge of Spies, Saving Private Ryan, Munich, and of course, Schindler's List.

Bernard (Butch) Epps earned his undergraduate degree from Loyola Marymount University, graduating cum laude as an award-winning film production major. He received his MFA from the UCLA School of Film and Television's graduate Producers Program, where he specialized in story development and working with screenwriters.

The Magic of Motown
