

### C.H.I.L.L. AND SASUP CONFERENCE

The C.H.I.L.L. Board of Directors attended and presented at the SASUP (Southeastern Association of School-University Partnerships) conference on Hilton Head Island in South Carolina.

They presented two sessions titled, 'C.H.I.L.L. Adventures: Letting Our Light Shine Bright' and 'A Guiding Light for Future Educators.' ## C.H.I.L.L. OCTOBER MONTHLY MEETING - MENTAL HEALTH



#### **Deaf/Hard of Hearing Licensure Program**

A graduate level program designed to prepare **Indiana teachers** to work with students who are deaf and hard of hearing.

#### **Details**

- Licensure program consists of 20 credit hours, offered primarily through distance education.
- Cohorts begin each spring and students typically take one course per semester (including the summer session).
- The PASS project provides lodging for candidates to attend the weekend seminars if they live 50 miles or more outside of Indianapolis and are a teacher employed by a school system or special education cooperative within Indiana.
- Candidates are required to attend all face-to-face classes which are typically held in Indianapolis.


