### **New Members**

☐ Step One: Find OLLI Online

Type **indianastate.edu/olli** into your browser search bar.

☐ Step Two: Register

Click on the blue bar that says **CLICK HERE TO REGISTER**.

☐ Step Three: Create Membership Account You must set up a membership account in order to register. It's easy. Click through the following sequence.

### **Privacy**

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Indiana State University does not share, sell, or rent its mailing lists. ### Registration

Registrations can be taken online, through the mail, or over the phone, though online registration is the most efficient and preferred method of registration. Registrations are non-transferable; no day-of or walk-in registrations accepted. Those who present themselves at a course or event without registration will not be permitted to attend.

### Program Cancellation/Refund

In the event a program is canceled due to weather or other circumstances beyond the Institute's control, members will be notified by email and/or phone of the cancellation. If Indiana State University is closed or cancelled for any reason, OLLI at ISU programs will also be cancelled. Check local television and radio stations for notices of university closure. Cancelled programs may be rescheduled, and if so, those members enrolled in those programs may choose to either attend on the rescheduled date or receive a full refund. # Welcome to OsherOnline!

Get excited to learn from premier instructors with OLLI members from across the nation!

Osher Online was created by the Osher National Resource Center (NRC) at Northwestern University to expand member access, increase institute collaboration, share resources, and ensure the legacy of the Osher Institutes. Classes are delivered by the Osher NRC who will provide moderators and technical assistance.

# Cost: \$60 per course Limit: 13 per course

After registering for Osher Online classes, students will receive a welcome email from the Osher NRC that includes an Osher Online username and password as well as a link to the Osher Online Website, through which classes will be accessed. The website holds the class Zoom link, syllabus, discussion board, and Customer Care contact information. Students will also have access to a pre-class orientation full of helpful information for accessing their classes.

It is recommended that students test their ability to log in prior to the start date of each new class. On class days, students are also encouraged to log on 10-15 minutes before the start time to provide ample opportunity to get tech support and troubleshooting from the NRC if necessary.

# First Class The History of the U.S. Post Office

With **Caroline Nappo, PhD**January 14, 21, 28 February 4, 11, 18

7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

What comes to mind when you think of the post office? Is it the unique beauty of a stamp, the thrill of an awaited delivery, or an iconic blue collection box? Do you equate the post office with obsolescence, or do you think of recent coverage of controversial austerity measures? As the country's second-largest employer, the US Post Office has a fascinating history that showcases the best

and worst of American society. This course explores what precipitated the creation of the Post Office, its role in fostering and hindering democratic communication, and numerous examples of innovation over the centuries up to the present-day USPS. The course concludes by considering what the future of the post office might look like, with a renewed appreciation for the democratic ideals for which it stands.

**Caroline Nappo, PhD** is an independent scholar with a master's and PhD in Library and Information Science from the University of Illinois who has published and presented on postal history.

# 100 Years of Magic The Disney Legacy & Influence

With Emma Miller, MBA

January 15, 22, 29 February 5, 12, 19
3:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

This course explores the 100-year history of one of the largest and most globally recognized brands, Walt Disney. It starts by understanding Walt himself, and then dives into the organization's different business units, exploring the film and media side of the business as well as the parks and resorts. The class "peeks under the hood" at what it is like to work at Disney, and the course

closes by learning about Disney's leadership over the years and how they have wielded their influence in politics. Throughout this course, the instructor will seek out varying perspectives, giving the class a view from those who revere the Magic Kingdom, those who critique it, and everywhere in between.

Emma Miller, MBA started her career working for the Mouse, which was the travel agency sales arm of Walt Disney World Parks and Resorts. Since then, she has worked in media and marketing, including time at McDonalds. Miller holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Notre Dame and an MBA from the University of Chicago.

## Storytelling & Self

With **Jen Baker, PhD**January 23, 30 February 6, 13, 20, 27
7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

This course explores the internal stories we tell ourselves and the external stories we tell others. Our internal stories define us, and our attitudes and emotions toward ourselves. Our external stories are outward-focused and lean toward a conversational resume, to some extent. The course considers our life as a series of chapters, or phases, and spends time investigating our

current stories. It also explores how we envision our future story. By the end of this six-week course, participants will have a future story to share.

Jennifer (Jen) Baker, PhD is an expert in the interdependence of communication theory and practice. She has been teaching communication courses for over 20 years, starting at the University of Texas at Austin, then the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and now at Columbia College Chicago and Northwestern University.

### Wisdom

With **David Smith, PhD**January 23, 30 February 6, 13, 20, 27
1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Wisdom is the ability to apply knowledge in the real world in a constructive way—to enrich individual lives and to make the world a better place. Wisdom is often found at the intersection of theory and experience. How does modern expertise benefit the individual, and how can that person convince the general population to value it? How does life experience create wisdom? This course

explores the biological, philosophical, social scientific, and experiential aspects of wisdom and analyzes what ancient and contemporary sources have to say about it.

**David E. Smith, PhD** grew up in the world of fundamentalist religion. After earning an MA in philosophy of religion, he received a second MA and a PhD in religious studies from Temple University. Formerly a philosophy and religious studies faculty member at Central Washington University, he now offers independent seminars and personal consultations in comparative religion and philosophy. He has published widely in these areas.

### My Native Land in Memory Stories of a Cuban Childhood

With **Olivia Espin, PhD**January 24, 31 February 7, 14, 21, 28
1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Using Dr. Espín's memoir of childhood and adolescence, which was the recipient of the San Diego Book Award in 2021, the class discusses the Cuban political landscape in the mid-20th century. This memoir recreates a world that no longer exists: pre-revolutionary Cuba in the 1940s and 50s. Cuba's fraught history and political instability are interwoven with a personal story to create a web of

history, family, and cultural analysis. This is a young woman's individual struggle for identity and independence against the background of the country's national struggle. Family photographs and site photographs illustrate the details of the story and the process and meaning of memory and memoir for authors and readers. Dr. Espin will read some excerpts to illuminate the narrative.

**Oliva M. Espín, PhD** is Professor Emerita in the Department of Women's Studies at San Diego State University and the California School of Professional Psychology of Alliant International University.

### **Huck Finn's America**

With **Jeff Walker, PhD**January 27 February 3, 10, 17, 24 March 3
1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Mark Twain's Adventures of Huckleberry Finn is often misunderstood as a boy's adventure book or merely a dialogue on race. Instead, this classic novel addresses youth violence and bad boys, schools and parents, and civil rights and minstrel shows. The novel, banned in New England, needs to be read and discussed anew for a better understanding of America, then and now. Join this

course for a new and fresh analysis of this highly criticized and misunderstood novel.

Jeffrey Walker, PhD, Emeritus Professor of English at Oklahoma State, is a Fulbright lecturer in Norway and Belgium where he won the Phoenix Award for outstanding graduate teaching, the A&S Outstanding Professor Award, and the Regents Distinguished Teaching Award. His teaching interests include American literature, Dickens, the history of the book, textual editing, comedy, mystery, and film.

# Color & Symbolism in Art History

With **Eleanor Schrader**January 27 February 3, 10, 17, 24 March 3
5:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Artists use color to create an array of symbolism, emotions, and sociopolitical meanings within the context of the time period in which they created their works of art. Additionally, within these works, artists utilized their knowledge of color to portray mood, light, depth, and point of view. Progressing through the colors of the rainbow each week, the class will discuss a variety of

paintings throughout art history to understand the artists' intention and the stories behind the paintings within their respective color spheres. The class will also discuss the histories of color, their meanings in various societies and cultural contexts, and the materials and processes used to make colors.

Eleanor Schrader is an award-winning educator, lecturer, and author. She is a Professor Emeritus of Art and Architectural History at Santa Monica College. She has completed graduate work in fine and decorative arts at Sotheby's Institute in London and New York. She has served as a design review commissioner for the City of Beverly Hills.

# Immigrants in America Stories of Jazz, Blues, Rock & Pop Culture

With **Emanuel Abramovits, MBA**January 27 February 3, 10, 17, 24 March 3
5:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

This course documents the fertile interaction between minorities that transformed both 20th century music and the entire entertainment industry. It examines how minorities significantly impacted American popular culture and explores their contributions to various musical genres, record labels, booking agencies, venues, innovations, and production. With strong support from

audiovisuals, anecdotes, and the instructor's decades of experience as a concert promoter working with some of the biggest names in the industry, the class will learn about Irving Berlin, George Gershwin, Benny Goodman, Stan Getz, Norman Granz, Bob Dylan, Milt Gabler, Leonard Cohen, Lou Reed, Al Kooper, Adam Sandler, Avishai Cohen, Kiss, and many more.

**Emanuel Abramovits, MBA**, has been a concert promoter for over two decades. He is directly involved in events by international artists like Itzhak Perlman, Gustavo Dudamel, Sarah Brightman, Roger Hodgson, ASIA, Journey, Kenny G., and many more.

# Modern War What Is It Good For?

With Jeff Rice, MSc

January 28 February 4, 11, 18, 25 March 4 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Vietnam, viewed by many as a turning point between old and new approaches to war, raised many questions about the role of superpowers, asymmetrical resources, and counterinsurgencies on the world stage. This course looks at the wars in Vietnam, Iraq, Afghanistan, Ukraine, and Gaza. All of these wars are asymmetrical, but what else do they have in common, and how are they informed

by Vietnam? The class discusses how superpowers are central players in these conflicts by way of their supplies and support. It also examines human ways of evaluating the politics and strategies, particularly what happens when three vectors cannot agree: the public, politicians, and the military.

Jeff Rice, MSc attended Northwestern University then pursued graduate work at the University of Edinburgh. He is currently an Emeritus Senior Lecturer in political science at Northwestern, specifically in the areas of US history of the 60's, military strategy, and student protest and free speech.

### A Tourist's Tour of the Wider Universe

With **Andrew Fraknoi, MS**January 28 February 4, 11, 18, 25 March 4
5:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

The James Webb Space Telescope, orbiting a million miles from Earth in the deep freeze of space, has sent back remarkable information and dramatic images of the faint heat rays that come from objects in the universe. The Hubble Telescope continues to observe some of the same stars and galaxies with visible light. Never before have we had images of the cosmos so rich in color and

detail. This profusely illustrated course offers a guided tour of the wider universe as astronomers understand it today. Prof. Fraknoi covers this information in everyday language and without any math as he examines star birth and star death, the organization and structure of the Milky Way, cosmic mergers and collisions, and the great web of galaxies that provides clues about the beginning and development of the cosmos.

**Andrew Fraknoi, MS** was the Chair of the Astronomy Department at Foothill College. He appears regularly on local and national radio, explaining astronomical ideas in easy to understand terms.

### The Secret Lives of Familiar Birds

With **Elizabeth Burnette, MS**January 29 February 5, 12, 19, 26 March 5
11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

The earth is populated with billions of birds, yet to many they remain mysterious. This course examines the fascinating characteristics, habits, and lives of North American birds including how they keep warm, how they fly, when, why, and how they sing, and more. The classes will be divided into these categories: bird ancestry and anatomy, diet and nesting, flight and migration, threats,

and behavior and songs. The class will also cover birds of prey, songbirds, waterfowl, and the common loon. Join this interesting exploration of how birds live, move, breathe, and think.

**Elizabeth Burnette, MS** attended Cornell University for a BS in engineering physics, worked on Space Shuttle experiments at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, then obtained a master's degree in Astrophysics from the University of Pittsburgh. Burnette has been teaching astrophysics, physics, and science for the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Pitt and is a returning Osher Online instructor.

### The World of Musical Satire

With **David Misch**January 29 February 5, 12, 19, 26 March 5
7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Satire is one of the oldest forms of humor. Adding music seems to make it even more powerful. This course explores the art of musical satire in a variety of genres, cultures, and eras, especially in America since 1950. This multimedia course covers *Yankee Doodle*, Gilbert and Sullivan, the Gershwins, the Marx Brothers, Monty Python, *Saturday Night Live*, *South Park*, and *Key and* 

Peele. It also cover a bountiful bevy of B's: Bernstein, the Beatles, Bo Burnham, and Bugs Bunny. Because satire is often dependent on social and historical events, this course is as much cultural history as music appreciation. And while words are preeminent in musical satire, we will also discuss the music and its interactions with lyrics.

**David Misch** is a former stand-up comedian, screenwriter (*Saturday Night Live*, *Mork and Mindy*, and *The Muppets Take Manhattan*), author, and lecturer at Yale, Columbia, Oxford, Sony, DreamWorks, Lucasfilm, Disney, Second City, and the Actors Studio.

## Science Everyone Needs to Know

With **Kjir Hendrickson, PhD**January 30 February 6, 13, 20, 27 March 6
1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Regardless of one's choice of news media, it is nearly impossible to navigate today's information-heavy world without coming across stories on topics such as evolution, vaccines, and global warming. Each of these topics is the subject of various conspiracy theories and misinformation campaigns. How does a person make sense of what they hear on the news when so much

information comes from unvetted and non-neutral sources, such as the Internet and the media? This course is a non-technical introduction to these three critical matters in modern science. The class examines what scientists know, how they know what they know, how certain they are, and why there is such a disconnect between scientific understanding and the public's perception of the science.

**Kjir Hendrickson, PhD** is a teaching professor in the School of Molecular Sciences at Arizona State University and the author of the textbook *Chemistry in the World*.

# Whole-Person Health & Well-Being Innovative Care from the Osher Collaborative for Integrative Health

January 31 February 7, 14, 21, 28 March 7 3:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

This course provides a unique opportunity to learn from the experts in the Osher Collaborative for Integrative Health, an international group of eleven academic health centers funded by The Bernard Osher Foundation to study, teach, and practice integrative healthcare. The eleven Osher Centers are located at highly respected medical schools and medical centers and emphasize integrative healthcare approaches to promote health and well-being. Each Osher Center focuses on whole-person health and wellness using healing strategies such as acupuncture and East Asian Medicine, Ayurvedic medicine, yoga, massage, meditation, physical activity, and nutrition. In this course, Osher Collaborative practitioners, researchers, and educators will discuss the science behind integrative healthcare remedies and explain its impact.

# Women: The Forgotten "Men" in History

With **Diana Carlin, PhD**March 31 April 7, 14, 21, 28 May 5
3:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Many individuals contribute to history but never get their due. Women and other marginalized groups traditionally received less ink in history books than the "great men" of history who were mainly white males. This course looks at nine women (three each session) whose achievements are not commonly known. Among the nine are a scientist, a winner of the Nobel Peace Prize, a

pioneering pilot, a suffragist, a candidate for the US presidency, a rights activist for women and African-Americans, a British anthropologist, and a pioneering politician from the Western US.

**Diana Carlin, PhD** is Professor Emerita of communication at Saint Louis University. For 30 years, she has taught courses on and written about First Ladies. She is the co-author of *U.S. First Ladies: Making History and Leaving Legacies* and *Remember the First Ladies: America's History-Making Women*. Carlin writes on the topics of women in politics, presidential communication, and political debate.

### The Essential Jane Austen

With Juliette Wells, PhD March 31 April 7, 14, 21, 28 May 5 5:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

In honor of Jane Austen's 250th birthday in 2025, this class explores her life, works, and legacy from a fresh perspective. Both seasoned readers and those new to Austen will appreciate experiencing the story of her authorship through images of original documents and artifacts. Warmly supported by her family, especially her clergyman father, Austen began writing fiction in her

teenage years but was in her thirties before her first book was published. Discover what happened during those years and how a household of creative women made it possible for her to focus on her writing and achieve publication. The class considers how and why her literary reputation grew after her death and why contemporary adaptations and retellings continue to broaden her readership.

**Juliette Wells, PhD** is a Professor of Literary Studies at Goucher College, known for her groundbreaking research on Jane Austen.

# Bonsai An Ancient Art in Modern Times

With Chris Baker

March 31 April 7, 14, 21, 28 May 5 7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Bonsai is a centuries-old practice of training trees in containers to resemble those in nature. This course explores the key components of bonsai: horticulture, design, and technical skills. By the end of the course, students will understand how to maintain a healthy tree, develop their own design style, and apply essential techniques. Whether new or experienced in bonsai or

simply curious, this course guides each learner through the fundamentals of this fascinating art form.

Chris Baker has worked with bonsai for over 18 years, beginning as an enthusiast with a passion for horticulture and nature. His career shifted after a meeting with bonsai curator Jack Sustic at the U.S. National Arboretum in 2010, leading him to volunteer and eventually study with bonsai master Tohru Suzuki in Japan. In 2014, Baker became the first full-time curator of the Chicago Botanic Garden's bonsai collection.

# The Magic of the Brill The Soundtrack of Rock & Pop in the 50s & 60s

April 1, 8, 15, 22, 29 May 6 5:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Beginning in New York City in the 50s, where the echoes of Tin Pan Alley's Great American Songbook still resound, a new generation of talented songwriters and musicians filled the airwaves and shaped the soundtrack of popular American culture. This course is a journey into the melodies, stories, and vibrant personalities behind the Brill Building era of the late 50s and 60s. The class

discusses the music of legendary songwriters such as Carole King & Gerry Goffin, Neil Sedaka & Howard Greenfield, Phil Spector, Jerry Leiber & Mike Stoller, Burt Bacharach & Hal David, Neil Diamond, and others. The class rediscovers tunes from Elvis Presley, the Drifters, Dionne Warwick, the Ronettes, the Monkees, Manfred Mann, Andy Williams, the Righteous Brothers, and many others.

**Michael Agron** has delivered engaging seminars for Sacramento State University's Renaissance Society as well as numerous lifelong learning organizations across the nation

### **Crossword Puzzle Creation**

With **Steve Weyer**April 2, 9, 16, 23, 30 May 7
3:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Curious about how crossword puzzles are created? This course appeals to those interested in constructing crosswords, understanding the process, or becoming better solvers. All steps of crossword puzzle creation will be explored, including tools, formats, themes, grid block arrangement, challenging clues, and more. The course also covers how to submit a puzzle for publication. After

a brief introduction to free-form style puzzles, the focus will shift to U.S. newspaper-style, symmetric, themed 15 x 15 puzzles like those in the *New York Times*, including an OLLI-themed puzzle. Several crossword puzzles will be constructed collaboratively throughout the course.

**Steve Weyer** has been a cruciverbalist (crossword aficionado) since the 1990s. He is the creator of CrozzWord, a mobile app for crossword solving. Weyer constructs crosswords for libraries and other organizations and publications. His first *New York Times* crossword debuted in November 2023.

# Future Proofing Your Healthspan & Longevity

Longevity comes down to one simple truth: the ability to weather the inevitable challenges life unexpectedly presents. Resilience is the key to an extended healthspan. Western society is entering a phase of significant transformation that will change how aging is experienced. This course is a condensed version of Fulton's Whealthspan Masterclass, focusing on the five

foundations for extending healthspan and examining societal changes that will impact everyone. The latest and most relevant age-related science will be distilled for a general audience along with strategies for optimal outcomes that align with diverse cultures and values.

**Scott Fulton** is recognized internationally as a "Redefiner" in the positive aging space. Fulton researches improving adult aging outcomes. He teaches Lifestyle Medicine and Aging, is an American College of Lifestyle Medicine member, and sits on the prestigious True Health Initiative Council.

## Russia Beyond Russians

The Russian Federation is home to 180 nationalities, many of which have long been in conflict. Focusing on recent events in Russia and the post-Soviet space, this class examines how Tsars, Soviets, and President Vladimir Putin sought to impose uniformity, often diminishing ethnic groups. Through a historical lens, the class explores the struggles of these groups, from

peaceful movements like the Circassian movement to violent resistance like Chechnya. Contemporary Russian culture—including music, cinema, cuisine, and humor—will also be discussed to illuminate current events.

Asya Pereltsvaig, PhD received a degree in English and History from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and a PhD in Linguistics from McGill University. She taught at Yale and Stanford and has been teaching in lifelong education programs since 2010.

### Science Charcuterie

Some topics don't fit neatly into OLLI science classes—too big, too small, too little, too much, too off-topic—and often end up on the proverbial cutting room floor. In this course, these intriguing bits and ends are gathered up and presented like a charcuterie board of tasty science snacks. This six-week romp through just about anything one might imagine includes a little bit of color theory, a

morsel of genetic testing science, a dash of airplane physics, some lightning theory, a mouse that turns scorpion venom into a painkiller, current scientific thoughts on the origins of life, and a lot of time to explore topics of interest to the class. Students should bring their questions as the class explores some of the exciting nooks and crannies of science.

**Kjir Hendrickson, PhD** is a teaching professor in the School of Molecular Sciences at Arizona State University, holds a PhD in chemistry, and authored the textbook *Chemistry in the World*.

# Cinema in Transition Exploring Change through Classic Films

Spring brings new life as the world transitions from dormancy to vitality. This course offers an introduction to film movements and styles, featuring classic films with themes of change. local libraries. In each session, the film's style, story, techniques, and relevance to the theme of change will be unpacked, providing insight into how cinema reflects transformation in the world.

Jeremy Fackenthal, PhD, is an independent filmmaker and former Director of the Common Good International Film Festival (2019-2023). With a PhD in Philosophy of Religion and Theology, he blends philosophy with filmmaking. He has created a short documentary on spoken word poetry and is now working on a feature-length film.

## Car Crazy: 1950s Onward

The global car cultures, from American muscle

cars to Japan's futuristic designs, reflect unique societal identities and values. Vehicles have become symbols of creativity, status, and technological progress, with each region—from Germany's precision sports cars to Italy's performance masterpieces—showcasing human innovation and cultural expression.

**Pandora Paúl**, former curator at America's Automotive Trust and LeMay America's Car Museum, has curated award-winning exhibits and served on the Board of the National Association of Automobile Museums.

### Neurology in a Nutshell The Brain Explained

Unraveling the mysteries of the brain is the starting point for a class that navigates the complex, fragmented healthcare system and discusses strategies for advocating for personalized care. In addition to simplifying common neurological conditions—such as headaches, dizziness, stroke, Parkinson's disease, and memory loss—the course examines testing and imaging

of the nervous system. It also focuses on illness prevention through healthy lifestyles and provides an intimate discussion of end-of-life issues.

**Dr. Schanfield**, a retired neurologist from Minnesota, practiced privately for 40 years before retiring in 2015. He continues to teach medical students and residents as a Clinical Professor of Neurology at the University of Minnesota. In 2017, he was recognized as the first-ever Community Educator of the Month by the University of Neurology.

# Bella Napoli: Italy's (other) Eternal City With Anthony Antonucci, PhD & Hilary Haakenson, PhD April 11, 18, 25 May 2, 9, 16

Naples, founded by Greek colonists in the 8th century B.C.E., has a rich history shaped by various rulers, from Romans and Byzantines to the Spanish and Bourbons. It became the capital of the Bourbon Kingdom of the Two Sicilies in 1816 and joined unified Italy in 1861, beginning a period of modernization that continues today. This sixweek course explores Naples' complex history and

traditions through a "grand tour" of iconic sites, such as Castel dell'Ovo, the Duomo, Teatro San Carlo, and more, along with a taste of the city's famous food culture, including pizzerias and cafes.

**Anthony Antonucci, PhD** is a U.S. historian with a PhD from the University of Connecticut and is the recipient of a Fulbright IIE Research Fellowship.

Hilary Haakenson, PhD received her doctorate in Renaissance Art History from Rutgers University with a research focus on Italian cartography and civic monuments. She is a recipient of a Fulbright Fellowship.

### Virtuosos in Classical Music

Since its publication in 1951, J.D. Salinger's *The Catcher in the Rye* has been celebrated, vilified, copied, and banned. Join Rose-Hulman Professor of American Literature Caroline Carvill as she dives into this iconic coming-of-age novel and the world of Holden Caulfield, a 16-year-old boy who is expelled from prep school and searches for meaning in the adult world. 
